New Voices Program Manager & Senior Program Officer National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine

Alison Boland Reeves is the Senior Program Officer for Science and Engineering Capacity Development at the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine (NASEM). She manages the New Voices and Christine Mirzayan Fellowship programs. Prior to NASEM, Alison was the Public Management Track Lead for the Mandela Washington Fellowship for Young African Leaders at IREX and also ran fellowship programs on the ground in the International Office of The University of Texas at Austin. Alison has over 10 years of program management experience working in the nonprofit sector, higher education, and international development to elevate young leaders around the world.

Her previous experience includes three years of Peace Corps service in Mongolia (2009-2012), and she is passionate about mentoring program participants and creating engaging training experiences for learners at all levels. Alison grew up in Little Rock, Arkansas and earned her BA from Hampshire College in Amherst, Massachusetts. She completed her MFA in documentary film production at The University of Texas at Austin in 2015 along with a graduate certificate in nonprofit management.

As the Director of Operations and Coordination, Shonda is a member of the senior leadership teams for the Science & Technology Policy Fellowship and Mass Media Fellowship Programs. She plays a pivotal role in driving the successful execution of the immersive fellowship programs by leading projects and directing coordination within the team.

Shonda is accustomed to being the hub at the center of many spokes and joins AAAS after 18 years with the Society for Conservation Biology as the Program Director for the David H. Smith Conservation Research Fellowship where she was responsible for all program operations including facilitating the selection process, curating the professional development curriculum, and cultivating community amongst the network of fellows. She's been invited to present on leadership skills development in conservation science, mentoring components of fellowship programs, and building networks for conservation solutions at a variety of gatherings such as the International Congress for Conservation Biology and NASEM.

She is currently in training to be a certified Maryland Master Naturalist with the Anacostia Watershed Society.

Deborah has been with Washington Sea Grant since 2018, serving as the Fellowships and Research Lead. In this role, she oversees the competitive selection of students and recent graduates for various marine science fellowships in areas such as marine policy, fisheries, and communications.
